Alma Dalton passed away on April 3, 2021, just days before her April 24th birthday when she would have been 97.

What a life she lived. Born in Key West, Alma was the oldest daughter of James Bertram Pinder and Ida Elizabeth Cothran. Alma married Jack Dalton in 1942. Jack was in the Coast Guar, sta-

tioned at Alligator Lighthouse. They had two daughters.

How could we ever forget celebrating Alma's 96th birthday when the pandemic made drive-by celebrations the best way to share special days with loved ones. And Alma certainly was loved and what a celebration it was with fire trucks, sirens, and dozens of cars and trucks decorated for the occasion honking and singing in honor of Alma.

Alma certainly squeezed a lot of living into her years. Alma was just eleven years old when she experienced the devastation of the hurricane of 1935. She was one of just two remaining survivors of that storm.

Back in her era, she attended grade school in a one room school house on Upper Matecumbe and then went to Key West to start high school. She finished high school, living with relatives in Georgia. Alma was devoted to the Matecumbe United Methodist Church, founded by her grandfather. `

Alma is survived by her daughter Marge and husband Ted McGraw and her granddaughter Corie and husband Terry Abel along with two great granddaughters.

"The Four Winds" by Kristen Hannah - The story is of a family as they struggle through the Dust Bowl/Depression era and the impact the dust storms had on their lives and livelihood. Promises of greener pastures out west drive the family to seek a better life. Kristen Hanna's writing is captivating and you cannot put it down.

"Maybe You Should Talk to Someone" by Lori Gottlieb. This book was recommended by Maria as a good self-help book. The author is a therapist who shares the stories of her patients as well as her own as she too seeks help from a therapist to deal with life's challenges.

"Very Valentine" by Adriana Trigiani. This is the first book in a trilogy about an Italian family. The setting takes place in Manhattan and Italy as the family struggles to save the family shoe business. Valentine works as an apprentice to her grandmother, Teodora, to learn the shoemaking craft and bring it into the twenty-first century and save the company from ruin.

"Marching Through Culpeper: A novel of Culpeper, Virginia, Crossroads of the Civil War" by Virginia Beard Morton. The author provides a historically accurate view of life in the Civil War from the Southern perspective. The setting is Culpeper, Virginia, located between Washington, D.C. and Richmond. The city changed hands multiple times during the war. One reviewer rated this as a better view of the war than "Gone With The Wind".

"Your Body's Many Cries for Water; You're Not Sick You're Thirsty Don't Treat Your Thirst with Medication" by Dr. F. Batmanghelidj. The stories included are from twenty years of Dr. Batmanghelidj's clinical and scientific research into the role of water in the body. Dry mouth is not the only sign of dehydration. Drinking water is an easy and accessible option as a first step when something doesn't feel right.

ther worked jobs as a labor negotia- Defense and other federal agencies. tor. When Rob was five, the family moved to Venezuela where they spent three years. Rob and his sis-

ters enjoyed many adventures there in the tropical jungle and the high ridges of the Andes Mountains. And so as a very young boy, Rob learned to speak a second language.

When Rob was eight, the family returned to the United States and eventually settled in California where the family spent the next ten years. In 1974, straight from high school, Rob joined the Army. The Army tested him and determined his talent was in learning languages so Rob earned the designation - linguist. And the language he was assigned: Korean. They shipped him off to Korea for a 13-month stint capturing signals coming out of North Korea. He sat near the top of a mountain where equipment was set up to intercept the signals, but during the occasions when the equipment failed, Rob took over. Most Eventually the Boy Scouts moved Rob to the Florida Nadays he had plenty of spare time and that is when Rob began reading the Bible and feeling empowered by God as a Christian. Rob managed to get through Leviticus in the Old Testament, and then moved on to the New Testament, while sitting on that mountaintop in Korea.

After Rob returned from Korea, he decided his days as a linguist were done and he left the Army and enrolled in college.
