From the Pastor's Desk:

The year was 1637 and the place was Eilenbery, Germany and all of Eurpope were at war.

Eilenbery had sustained heavy damage in three separate attacks and thousands of refugees arrived adding to the chaos. Luxuries disappeared, food was scarce, disease was rampant and life was extremely difficult. Rev. Martin Rinkard was the only pastor in that community and his journal records that in one year, he conducted more than 4500 funerals. One of the occupying armies even demanded tribute payments from already impoverished people. It would seem that there was nothing for which to be grateful. No earthly reason to be thankful and yet, in that same year (1637), Pastor Rinkard wrote these words: "Now thank we all our God, with hearts and hands and voices. Who wondrous things hath done. In whom His world rejoices; Who, from our mother's arms, hath blessed us on our way, with countless gifts of love, and still is ours today." It's a song that more than 350 years later can be found in the United Methodist Hymnal (p. 102). We all face times when life seems unfair, yet as we approach the Advent season, we are reminded there is hope. In the words of the Angel Gabriel to Mother Mary, "Nothing is impossible with God." Celebrate this Christmas season with joy, peace, and hope. "Now thank we all our God."

Stained Glass



The Stained Glass Group is taking on a new approach for its artistic efforts. Over the last two decades they created the Bible story themed windows for the church and lighthouse themed windows for fellowship hall. The current target is smaller works which are easier to display and transport, such as ornaments and sun catchers. Items can be purchased during the normal workshop hours on Tuesday and Thursday. Labor Day Celebration











The Matecumbe Historical Trust held its annual service at the Hurricane Monument in memory of the 500 plus who perished in the 1935 Labor Day Hurricane. This year's Labor Day program fell on September 2... 84 years to the day since the catastrophic 1935 Hurricane destroyed almost all of Upper and Lower Matecumbe.

We commemorated the many Matecumbe United Methodist Church members who died in that storm. Nan Inches headed a committee that served fresh lemonade and cookies to attendees. Nan also created a large wreath, which Victoria and Ed Kattel presented at the celebration. It was an opportunity to also honor our two surviving members, Alma Dalton, and Norman Parker, and to rejoice that our church is alive and well! Alma was recognized as the only survivor in attendance. Lee Gannaway, Gretel Duncan, Kathy Sill, and Gail Gargano assisted with the refreshments. Mangrove Mike donated the lemons.

History Corner



Victoria Kattel has researched the early history of our church from its beginnings in 1894 when founded by Richard Pinder. Here are the first several paragraphs of her historical account of the church:

In September 1900, Preston Pinder made a promise to his grandfather, Richard Pinder, to continue the work of the Church and Sunday school Richard started on the Island of Upper Matecumbe in 1894. Preston and Johnny Russell had to conduct many services themselves since pastors from Miami only did the Keys circuit once a month. Church services were announced by the ringing of the church bell. People arrived from Matecumbe and surrounding keys. Some walked, others arrived by sail or rowboat.

The little wood frame church was located on the East end of Upper Matecumbe island. In 1901 it was to be moved to a more central location. Two large rafts were made and lashed together. During high tide they were brought up on the beach as far as possible. Then, while the tides were changing, the building was rolled down to the water's edge and placed on the raft. When the tide came up again, the rafts set sail with the church riding to its new location. That site was on what is now Cheeca Lodge's beach. Not long after that, a church cemetery was established next to the church.

While the church was destroyed during the 1935 hurricane, the cemetery is still located along the beach at Cheeca.
